


Here it is. Enjoy Shlomo Cohen.


As of 11/2015, Zaydi and Grandma Scheier have exactly 100 lineal descendants.


THE SCHEIER FAMILY TREE






Grandma Scheier's (Stecher) Family Tree






Yakov Scheier was born in Tyczyna, Galicia halfway between Cracow and Lvov on February 11, 1887 and passed away July 30, 1980. (His birthdate was open to question.) He may have been older than 93. His father, Shmuel, a Rupschitzer Chasid, was born in 1859 to Tzvi and Bayla. His mother, Shaindel Mirl nee Gross was born in 1862 (apparently in Glogama) to Yakov and Rivka. He grew up in a city called Rzeszow. He was the third of ten children. He emigrated to the US in 1911 (?) coming by boat from Bremen, Germany.

Upon his arrival he went to live with his older sister Anna in Malden, Mass. were he learned a trade as a shoemaker. When he came to America he still had long Payos and wore Chassidishe garb. Soon after, it became necessary to work on Shabbos. Having no choice he did this. Later on he moved to Brooklyn where he married Annie Stecher in 1917. There he eventually opened a shoe store as part of his father-in-law's dry goods store at 256 New Lots Ave. on the corner of Malta. (The building is no longer there.) Although there was a legal battle over ownership of the building, he and Annie were to keep it. (Annie was sued by her mother who tried to prove that Annie was not her daughter. This, of course, destroyed their relationship and is why no one on the family has been named Malka.) The building had 5 apartments and the ground floor was eventually split into 2 stores. During the depression they had an income from the rentals on apartments and the stores as well as the shoe store profits and the fact that Yakov would often be asked to work as a cutter in a shoe manufacturing plant.

When Big Ab proposed to Savta, Zaydi Cohen went to Zaydi Scheier and made it clear that he would countenance no marriage if the store remained open on Shabbos. Zaydi Scheier closed the store and here we are.

They sold the building in 196? and moved into an apartment near Uncle Sam and Aunt Miriam in East Flatbush.

His wife Annie passed away on January 3, 1968. Several years later he remarried a woman named Pearl. They were married for ten years when she had a stroke. Due to severe arthritis it was difficult for Zaydi to get around. Nonetheless, for as long as he was able he visited Pearl every day. Shortly after he could no longer take care of himself easily. For a while he lived with Aunt Ruth and Uncle Bernie in the Bronx. Big Ab and Savta offered to have him come to Syracuse but for some reason he chose not to do this. At the end, he spent the last several months of his life in a nursing home, sharp as a tack right to the end. He passed away just after Josh and Ellie's chasuna when we were still in Eretz Yisroel.

Annie Scheier, nee Stecher, was born in the Lower East Side of Manhattan on January 4, 1896 and passed away on January 3, 1968 to Eliezer Yitzchok (Louis born December 9, 1867, died March 19,1931) and Malya, nee Pisakee (Mollie born May 23,1874, died October 3, 1952). To my knowledge they were not shomer shabbos although I have no idea of their history. I believe both immigrated to this country. I don't know if they were married already or not. Annie attended public school through junior high which was a rather good education for girls at that time. Whereas Zaydi was very reserved and quiet, Grandma was a live wire. I remember her always smiling.

There were four children. Ruth, the oldest, then a son Mordecai who died as a very young child, then Shirley and finally Sam.

The family had made plans for a 50th wedding anniversary party but, due to a snow storm, the Syracuse contingent couldn't make it. The party was eventually held for the 51st anniversary. Tzvi was already in Yeshiva in Eretz Yisroel, otherwise the whole family was there. We held the party in the Famous restaurant on the lower East side. I picked up Grandma and Zaydi to bring them to the party. Grandma had me bring along a box. After the restaurant we all went to Uncle Bernie and Aunt Ruth's apartment in Queens. Grandma asked me to bring the box upstairs. There she proceeded to give away virtually all her personal belongings. Each grandchild received a bond. Big Ab and Savta returned to Syracuse and a day later were told they had to come back for the Levaya. Grandma had gotten up in the middle of the night, it seems she had vomited on her nightgown and needed to rinse it. She went back to bed, passed away quietly in the night and Zaydi found her in the morning.
